CAYUGA-SENECA CANAL

The Cayuga-Seneca Canal connects New York's two largest Finger Lakes with the Erie Canal and the world beyond. Cayuga and Seneca Lakes and the canal combine to form 92 miles of navigable waterway stretching from Ithaca and Watkins Glen to Geneva. Waterloo, Seneca Falls, and Montezuma. The area includes Seneca Falls, celebrated as the birthplace of the women's rights movement, Montezuma National Wildlife Refuge, and the Finger Lakes Region, renowned for its natural beauty, elegant architecture, wine country, and world-class cultural and recreational attractions.

The canal follows the Seneca River from Seneca Lake Outlet near Geneva to its confluence with the Erie Canal and Clyde River at Montezuma.

THE FINGER LAKES

Massive glaciers, with ice more than a mile thick, covered most of Upstate New York during the Ice Age (2 million to 6,000 years ago) and carved a series of deep north-south valleys. Today several of those glacial valleys are filled with water, forming long narrow lakes that look like fingers on a hand. The high ground between the lakes has good soil and a microclimate that encourages farming—first wheat and other grains, then apples, now grapes that are pressed to make the region's wines.

Most of the Finger Lakes drain to the north. The two largest, Cayuga Lake and Seneca Lake, are connected to the Erie Canal and the rest of the maritime world by way of the Seneca River/Cayuga-Seneca Canal. Canal boats and steamers plied the lakes during the 1800s when the Chemung Canal connected the southern end of Seneca Lake to Elmira and the Pennsylvania coalfields and the Crooked Lake Canal linked Seneca and Keuka lakes.

Dramatic scenery, bucolic farmland, charming villages, great locally grown food, and beverages draw visitors to the Finger Lakes. Many of those sights and attractions are accessible from the water. Several wineries have docks and invite boaters to visit and sample.

water paddling—far more exposed than you'll encounter on the canals. The Finger Lakes are long, narrow, and over 600 feet deep in some places. Waves can build rapidly, especially when the wind is out of the north or south and gets funneled between the hills. Most of the shoreline is privately owned and there are only a few public places to launch a boat or get off the water. Those sites are often on opposite sides of the lake. Plan your route, know your escape points, and keep an eye on the weather before heading out.

SENECA LAKE


Seneca Lake, one of the longest of New York's Finger Lakes, stretches 38 miles from Montour Falls and Watkins Glen in the south to its outlet at the head of the Seneca River near Geneva in the north. The lake's surface covers 66.9 square miles and its maximum depth is 618 feet.

During the 1800s it was a major route for maritime commerce and its bottom is dotted with shipwrecks, including dozens of canal boats. Canal boats on the Chemung Canal carried fuel from the coal fields of Pennsylvania to Seneca Lake and on to the industrial cities across upstate New York. The Crooked Lake Canal carried produce from

the rich farmlands along Keuka Lake. Both of those waterways closed during the 1870s but the Cayuga-Seneca Canal still provides a vital link between Seneca Lake and the connected navigable waterways of eastern North America.

PADDLING NOTE: Wind and weather can rapidly change Seneca Lake from placid to dangerous. The bottom is littered with shipwrecks—canal boats, steamers, schooners, and pleasure craft. Much of the shoreline is privately owned and public access points are far apart. It is beautiful country but pay heed to the weather forecast before heading out.

MONTOUR FALLS

Montour Falls is the southernmost point on today's New York State Canal System. From 1833 to 1878 it also marked the northern end of the Chemung Canal—a waterway that carried coal and lumber from northern Pennsylvania to growing industrial cities along New York's canals. It stands on the site of the Seneca Indian village of Queanettquaga that was destroyed in 1799 as part of the Sullivan-Clinton scorched-earth campaign of the American Revolution. Incoming settlers named it Mills Landing, then Havana, before it was renamed Montour Falls in 1895 after Queen Catherine Montour, a Seneca leader who lived there and led the village before the war.

WATKINS GLEN

Watkins Glen is at the south end of Seneca Lake. It was an important transshipment point between Chemung Canal boats and railroad cars carrying coal and lumber from northern Pennsylvania to towns and factories across upstate New York. Salt production was also important and remains so today. Hot water is injected into the ground to dissolve underground salt veins and the resulting brine is pumped to the surface and evaporated. Two salt plants still operate at the southern end of Seneca Lake. Watkins Glen State Park, with its dramatic 400-foot-deep gorge, 19 waterfalls, pathways and footbridges is at the southern end of the village. Watkins Glen International motor speedway is on the hill southeast of town.



DRESDEN

Keuka Lake Outlet and the Crooked Lake Canal (1833-1877) empty into the west side of Seneca Lake at Dresden, just north of the large brick powerplant that is visible from the lake. Massive twin barges with a towering crane, moored about a mile offshore, are part of the US Navy Undersea Warfare Center's Seneca Lake Sonar Test Facility where sensing equipment is tested and calibrated in the lake's deep waters. Submarine components and large equipment are shipped to and from this facility via New York's Erie and Cayuga-Seneca canals. Keep clear—the mid-lake barge and shoreside facilities in Dresden are off-limits to the public.

Named for Rear Admiral William T. Sampson, who was born in nearby Palmyra, the site served as Sampson Naval Training Station during World War II and Sampson Air Force Base during the Korean Conflict. More than 411,000 Navy recruits got their basic training here, followed by 16,000 Air Force recruits. Between the wars its facilities were used as a temporary college campus for 15,000 GI Bill students. It became a state park in 1960.

GENEVA

Geneva rose at the northern end of Seneca Lake. It is at the head of the Cayuga-Seneca Canal, which connects the Finger Lakes to the Erie Canal, Great Lakes, and Atlantic Ocean. The canal had a significant impact on both agriculture and manufacturing and helped to fuel the city's growth and wealth. Today, Geneva is a major tourism hub offering a wide range of activities, including art and music. The best place to launch is at the Finger Lakes Welcome Center.





WATERLOO

The Village of Waterloo is the birthplace of the Memorial Day holiday. The first Memorial Day was held here in 1866 to honor the Civil War dead. Memorial Day became an official federal holiday in 1971. Today, Waterloo holds a three-day annual event called Celebrate Commemorate Memorial Day every May.

Waterloo residents were active in 19th Century the social reform movements. Several houses in the village were stops on the Underground Railroad. Some of the planning for the first women's right convention, held in Seneca Falls in 1848, took place here in the home of Quakers and activists Thomas and Mary Ann M'Clintock. The women drafted the Declaration of Sentiments to be presented at the convention while seated around a mahogany tea table in the front parlor. That table is now on display at the Smithsonian Institution. The M'Clintock House and the nearby Hunt House, where additional planning took place, are now part of the Women's Rights National Historical Park. Contact the park for hours.



SENECA FALLS



The historic village of Seneca Falls is a good example of how canals brought industry and social change together during the 19th century. Seneca Falls was a major industrial center, with factories that made pumps and fire engines, textiles, and a wide range of iron products. The elegant houses of Seneca Falls reflect the prosperity generated by manufacturing and canal transportation. Seneca Falls was also a center for social reform. The Abolitionist movement and the Underground Railroad were strong forces; so was the Temperance movement. The movement for women's rights, however, is the most recognized part of Seneca Falls' history.

On July 19 and 20, 1848 the first Convention on Women's Rights was held at the Wesleyan Chapel on Fall Street in Seneca Falls. Organized by Jane Hunt, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Mary Ann M'Clintock and others, it was the birthplace of the Women's Rights Movement.

Today the Elizabeth Cady Stanton House, the Wesleyan Chapel, and other sites are part of the Women's Rights National Historic Park.

Seneca Falls hosts Women's Rights Convention Days in July. Seneca Falls is an excellent starting or ending point for a paddling trip, with great places of interest, accommodations, and amenities.

Manufacturers relocated and some houses were hauled to higher ground but today's placid and often photographed waters look very different than the way the area looked during the 1800s.



FACILITIES: Portable toilets, camping. A floating dock is at the upstream end on the south side, near the lockhouse. The Elizabeth Cady Stanton House, part of Women's Rights National Historical Park, is a 700-foot walk from the dock

PADDLING NOTE: Water released below the lock through the tailrace of the hydroelectric plant on the north bank can cause crosscurrents and turbulence. Be aware.

Designated Biker-Hiker-Boater site.

These two locks form a tandem staircase lock. They replace five locks and canal segments that ran along the south bank of the river, under what is now Van Cleef Lake. The upper gates of Lock CS2 are the lower gates of CS3. The only other ones like this on the New York system are Locks E35 and E34



in Lockport at the western end of the Erie Canal. A foot- bridge crosses the canal just below the gates between the two chambers and provides an excellent vantage point to watch passing boats.

The lower 5.5 miles of the Cayuga-Seneca Canal run along the edge of Montezuma NWR, from the NY 89 bridge and Lock CS-1 to the confluence with the Erie Canal. This 9,800-acre wetland complex is a premier waterfowl watching site. Warbler and songbird migration peaks in mid-May. Mid-September to mid-November is peak viewing of up to 50,000 Canada geese and 150,000 ducks. Watch for great blue herons, ospreys, eagles, and swallows all summer long.


FACILITIES: The Seneca Trail leads from floating dock to outdoor exhibits, wildlife observation tower, restrooms, and refuge visitor center. Follow it to the north and then west to reach wildlife viewing areas, including an observation tower (0.2 miles) overlooking the Main Pool of Lake Montezuma. Continue on the trail to reach restrooms (0.3 miles) and the visitor center and Lodge Nature Store (0.4 miles).

The refuge loop road is open to one-way vehicle traffic during daylight hours. Pedestrian and bicycle access is prohibited during certain times of the year to avoid disturbing nesting wildlife.

The Clyde River enters the canal on the west bank, just north of the Thruway Bridge. It is possible to paddle about 1.9 miles upstream during low and moderate flow periods to a steep take-out on a riprap bank at the DEC Fishing Access Site off Rt 105A, the access road to Lock E25.

The western end of the Seneca River Crossing Canals Historic District begins here; the eastern end is in the Town of Montezuma. The district includes the Enlarged Erie Canal prism (dating 1849-1857) and remnants of the original Erie Canal. The district was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2005.

This triangular island marks the junction of the Cayuga-Seneca and Erie canals.

PADDLING NOTE: Lock E25 is about 1.5 miles to the west. If you pass through the chamber during operating hours there is a take-out on a back channel above the lock. (See page 119 for description). Paddlers continuing downstream on the Seneca River portion of the Erie Canal will pass the ruins of the 1845 Richmond Aqueduct and can find an oftenmuddy informal pull-out below the Rt. 31 bridge about 1.3 miles downstream of the junction. The next public access site below that is the DEC Seneca River-Port Byron ramp about 7.6 miles below the junction.

CAYUGA I AKE

Cayuga Lake is the longest Finger Lake, stretching nearly 39 miles from Ithaca in the south to its outlet near the Village of Cayuga in the north. It is slightly shallower (max depth 435 feet) and narrower (max width 3.5 miles) than Seneca Lake.

After years of work, paddlers and shoreside communities launched the Cayuga Lake Blueway Trail in 2021. The Blueway features 12 public launch sites, with more on the way. Their website describes about two dozen day trip itineraries for paddlers: cayugalake.com/ cayuga-lake-blueway-trail/


