FIND YOUR PARK

Visit Women's Rights National Historical Park and the Cayuga-Seneca Canal

Visit the place that touched off the largest social movement in American History—the Women's Rights Movement—and discover the canal's role in spreading not only people and goods, but ideas and information. Starting in Seneca Falls, this itinerary presents options to experience some of the Finger Lakes great treasures: pristine lakes, the Cayuga-Seneca Canal, fine wineries, premier birdwatching, and recreational adventures.

How far? Locks 2 and 3 are just one mile from the Women's Rights National Historical Park visitor center. Head east on Fall Street, turn right on Ovid, then take your first left on E Bayard St., and turn left on Washington St. Visit Elizabeth Cady Stanton's home at 32 Washington Street, then proceed just a bit farther to see the locks.

Stand in the place where women and men first gathered to champion the rights of women. You'll be inspired by the words and actions of those who started and spread this revolutionary idea. In 1848 Elizabeth Cady Stanton and four other women invited the public to attend "...a Convention to discuss the social, civil, and religious rights and condition of women." This now famous gathering in Seneca Falls became the first Women's Rights Convention, a crucial beginning of the movement to advance the position of women in America.


While the campaign for women's right to vote is the most famous of the demands made at the convention, it was only one of many. Attendees also advocated for the right to equal educational opportunities, to property and earnings, and to the custody of children in the event of divorce or death of a spouse.

Start at the visitor center to get oriented, see the film and museum, and then head out to experience the Wesleyan Chapel, site of the first Women's Rights Convention. The park also includes the homes of three of the convention's organizers: Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Mary Ann M'Clintock, and Jane Hunt. If you are traveling with kids, be sure to pick up a Junior Ranger Activity book.

Cayuga-Seneca Locks 2 and 3

Seneca Falls

Visit Locks 2 and 3 to see the canal in operation. The two lock chambers are connected like a staircase and work in sequence to lift and lower boats a total of 49-feet.

Choose from these great options for active recreation in this area:

Walk the Ludovico Sculpture Trail

Take a stroll along the canal on the 1.75-mile Frank J. Ludovico Sculpture Trail. The trail is marked by numerous sculptures inspired by the women's rights movement. Access the park from Bridge Street in Seneca Falls.

Paddle the Cayuga-Seneca Canal

Launch your kayak or canoe at the waterfront park in Seneca Falls (access and parking on Souhan Lane off Water Street). Paddle downstream across VanCleaf Lake to Locks 2/3 or upstream toward Lock 4 and Waterloo.

Kayak and Canoe rentals

Rent a kayak or canoe in the nearby village of Waterloo to experience the Cayuga-Seneca Canal. Hourly, half-day, and full-day rental options are available from:
