

Theodore Roosevelt Inaugural National Historic Site and the Erie Canal

That do chicken wings, Theodore Roosevelt, Cheerios, and the Erie Canal have in common? Explore New York's second largest city and you'll quickly find out. Visit the site where Theodore Roosevelt took the oath of office, then head to the heart of the city transformed by the Erie Canal in 1825. When the canal opened, Buffalo became the hub of transportation, immigration, and commerce. Today, a renaissance taking place at Canalside, Buffalo's historic canal district, is making the waterfront one of western New York's most vibrant places to explore and enjoy. Choose from boating, cycling, and hiking options to add active adventure to your journey.

Immerse yourself in the sights, sounds and emotions surrounding the pivotal moment in our nation's history when in 1901 Theodore Roosevelt took the oath of office to become president of the United States. As governor of New York, T.R. championed modernization of the state's waterways, leading to the canal system that we use today. As president, he pushed for construction of the Panama Canal between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. Discover how the enduring legacy of one of America's greatest presidents affects our lives today. Note that visits are by guided tour only. Reservations recommended, available online at TRSite.org. Check the website or call for tour times. If you are traveling with kids, be sure to pick up a Junior Ranger activity book.

Head to the waterfront for history, fun, and great recreation. The historic western terminus of the Erie Canal has become the centerpiece of waterfront revitalization in Buffalo. Stroll the site to see restored elements of the original Erie Canal Harbor, including Commercial Slip, the historic connection between the Erie Canal and the Great Lakes, and the wooden plank Central Wharf. Events, festivals, and boat tours are on tap throughout the summer season, while The Ice at Canalside offers skating, ice biking, hockey and curling in winter.

Choose from these great options for active recreation in this area:

Cycle the Erie Canalway Trail

The western end of the 365-mile trail across New York begins in downtown Buffalo at Canalside (near the Naval & Military Park Museum). The route follows the Niagara River, with scenic views and park facilities, including picnic tables and rest rooms at Riverside Park, about five miles from Canalside. For a longer ride, cycle 13 miles to Tonawanda, where today's Erie Canal connects with the Niagara River.

Paddle the Inner Harbor and Buffalo River

Launch your kayak, canoe, or standup paddle board at Canalside and paddle through "elevator alley," where Buffalo's giant historic grain elevators line the Buffalo River. Nowhere else will you get this unique perspective on Buffalo's history as one of the nation's busiest ports during the 1800s and 1900s. Rentals are available at:
